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Dear Parents,


Welcome back to school, it is lovely to see the children again. We hope you all had a restful Christmas and wish you all a Happy New Year. At the end of last term, we were pleased to welcome so many parents back into the playground to share our Christmas carols. We really appreciate that you were able to join us for this special moment, and we look forward to sharing many more of these occasions with you all.

Over the last couple of weeks, the children in Class 1 have thoroughly enjoyed getting started with their learning for our new topic '*Street Detectives'*. They began by entering the world of Katie Morag and learning about her life on the Isle of Struay. Having listened to some of the stories about the adventures of feisty Katie Morag, as well as taking a virtual tour of Struay with the infamous redhead herself, the children attempted to make maps of Struay; plotting the destinations that she visited and using keys to identify different locations on the island. The children are looking forward to using their developing skills to learn more about our local community, looking at old and new houses in Farway and Honiton, as well as finding out how our village and local town have changed since their mums, dads and grandparents were young. They will also be investigating what is special about our geographical surroundings next week and beyond.

In our 'Daily Dashboard' sessions, Class 1 have been thinking about 'what has happened on this day throughout history'. During these first weeks back, the children have been surprised to learn more about epiphany, as well as taking a deep dive into resolutions and the traditions surrounding New Year around the world. Class 1 also enjoyed listening to a variety of hits from 'The Beatles' and discovered that 10th January marked the anniversary of George Harrison leaving his bandmates. They were interested to learn more about how the band came to be and were keen to review the best album covers for our British Values display! In other Music news, the children were introduced to our Composer of The Month, Mozart. When examining the man himself, they listened to a variety of his works and were gripped by the story of The Magic Flute. Meanwhile, in our weekly Music lessons the children were very excited to begin learning the recorder. To date they have learnt to hold and play the recorder in the correct position: becoming familiar with the instrument, and making a sound on first beat of the bar on the recorder.

It certainly hasn't been quiet in the outdoor learning space this week. The younger children in Class 1 were excited to find some new resources in the garden in the shape of our 'Making Music Wall'. Our E.Y.F.S. children enjoyed exploring the sounds that they could make using an array of kitchen items and have begun to learn the technical vocabulary for the sounds that they hear and make, including texture, dynamics and tempo!

In Collective Worship, Class 1 have begun to explore our new value: Hope. The children made links to their thinking about New Year's Resolutions when they acknowledged that we all have hopes: we hope the weather will be good, we hope our team will win, we hope our plans will succeed. They were able to discuss how sometimes hopes are high, we hope for the best, and at other times things go wrong, hopes seem to fade, flounder and get dashed. When reflecting on Collective Worship during our '10 a day', mental health time, the children recognised that hope is a key ingredient for our well-being; they noticed that it is important to hope when developing a growth mind-set and a positive mental attitude to learning. Class 1 will now work together to build a sense of hope in each



other: When we look out for each other and aim to build each other up with a kind word or words of praise, we make a positive difference to one another.

The children in Class 2 have started their new topic named *'Revolution'*. This is a history unit based on *'The Victorians'*. Children are developing their historical skills through handling artefacts and using primary and secondary sources, as well as art, to ask questions and learn about Victorian life and the influence of Queen Victoria on her subjects. The children will investigate the many changes in society in the reign of Queen Victoria as well as the important inventions. Class 2 look forward to inviting you in for *'Farway's Great Exhibition'* at the end of term, which will be a chance to share the things they have created and learnt- as long as COVID cases remain low.

In English, Class 2 are studying what we can learn through historical diaries and will be writing their own diary entries in role as a Victorian person. They have discovered that Queen Victoria's diaries are very formal and her language is old-fashioned compared to today. All children have a book from school to read, and a target, focusing on daily reading to build their stamina and fluency. At least twice a week, that daily reading should be on Bug Club, which includes the opportunity to ask questions about what they have read. Children are rewarded with house points for completing this home learning.

Over the first few weeks of term, Class 2 will be learning about the measurement of length, perimeter and area in maths. They have measured our outdoor environmental area to work out the size of each section and will use this learning in their Design and Technology and Geography lessons. You can help your child by practising measuring objects at home, focusing on lengths that are centimetres and metres e.g. 1 metre and 23 centimetres (1.23m) or centimetres and millimetres. Children should also continue to practice their times tables at home through TT Rockstars or practical writing, making sure they know the division facts that go with each multiplication. For example, $3 \times 4 = 12$ therefore $12 \div 3 = 4$.

Finally, our Year 3 girls represented Farway at a gymnastics event this week in Honiton. As always, they were well-behaved and a credit to the school and to yourselves.

It has been lovely this term to welcome our new Head of Learning, Mrs Tubbs. She is quickly getting to know the children and staff and is keen to get to know parents too. She has written this message to you all...

'It has been a really busy first couple of weeks back for all of us! I have really enjoyed getting to know all the children - they, along with all the staff, have made me feel very welcome. We have already been on a trip with the Year 3 and 4 children, and had a donation of some bulbs and gravel from Combe Garden Centre for our Key Stage 1 classes' science learning- thank you to them. A little bit about me- I live in Seaton, my family and I keep bees and myself and my husband have a dog called Luna. I look forward to meeting all of you- so please come and introduce yourself!'

As you know the Covid cases across Devon are beginning to rise. It would be a good idea to test your children regularly if you can. We will do our best to keep open in the normal way but if staff become poorly and we are unable to source supply cover (as you can imagine supply staff are in great demand!) we may need to join classes for sessions or indeed, as a last resort, close a class and move to remote learning. Please be assured that if this becomes necessary it really will be because we have tried every option and feel that we can't open safely. Please keep your eye on the home page of the website for urgent messages about school closure.

God's Special Promise

The world that God had made was a beautiful, colourful place – brimming with life and bursting with good things. It was his precious gift given with all his love.
