Farway Church of England Primary School

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Dear Parents,

It has been a busy couple of weeks for Class 1. The children have thoroughly enjoyed the beginning of our investigations into Chinese New Year as part of our new Literacy Unit. They first studied our new text 'Chinese New Year (Festivals Around the World)' by Grace Jones, and watched a PowerPoint and video to learn the story of the 12 animals of the zodiac. They found out about how Chinese New Year is celebrated around the world, and discovered a range of learning opportunities exploring this celebration further, whilst practising a range of cross-curricular skills. Some of these tasks have included using multiplication (Key Stage 1) and addition (E.Y.F.S.) to draw and colour a dragon in Maths, as well as using shapes to make dragon pictures. In Literacy, Class 1 read and followed instructions to make a paper lantern and in Music they made and played their own Chinese drums. They wrote Chinese numbers in the sand and painted Chinese symbols for the 12 animals of the zodiac. To develop their fine motor skills, they explored noodles with tweezers in the sensory tub and to develop their hand eye coordination and gross motor control they painted paper lanterns suspended from the ceiling. What a lovely Literacy unit this promises to be!

As part of Class 1's 'Street Detectives' learning, the children have been lucky enough to welcome some extremely knowledgeable visitors to our classroom over the last couple of weeks who have been able to talk about 'all things Farway'! The children had some really interesting questions to ask both of our visitors, including why they love Farway and what makes it special?

First, David visited to discuss how Farway has changed over the years. From school days in the 1940's, to prominent figures linked to Farway, the war years and evacuees, to employment and delivery rounds, David was able to offer a wealth of historical knowledge that afforded us a glimpse into the past and enabled us to consider how Farway might change in the future. The Class 1 children asked some fantastic questions that enabled them to consider whether or not the changes were good or bad, though they were a little frustrated that their findings proved somewhat inconclusive, since they could agree that there was a good deal of both positive and negative impact on the local area! The best part was that they were able to plot some local landmarks, previously unbeknownst to us, on our maps, for example where there was post office, a pub and a local blacksmith, as well as where a German pilot made craters when he dropped his ammunition!







Next, Steve talked to Class 1 about his job as a thatcher. The children learnt what a thatcher does and how! He was able to describe how thatching has changed over time and the different equipment and resources that a thatcher uses. They children dug out a map to look at Romania and Poland since much of the straw, as well as the hazel for the spars are imported from there. Remembering their learning from our previous topic, the children were quick to find out that thatching on modern buildings is decidedly safer than that on those that they investigated when learning about 'The Great Fire of London' since they now include a fireproof mat. Given that many of us live in older thatched properties the children thought it was interesting that due to the fact that older buildings are simply repaired and rethatched, these are much the same as they were in 1666 and the straw on the lowest layer will likely be the straw arranged there when the property was first thatched!





Class 1 would like to thank David and Steve for talking their time to come in to talk to the children about all things Farway, we all learnt lots and it has been useful supporting our learning about the geography and history of our valley!

The children in Class 1 have also really enjoyed their Art lessons recently and Miss Harvey-Jones could not be prouder of the work that they have produced. Their current unit began with the children looking at Monet's painting 'The Water Lily Pond'. They tried to describe this image and then closed their eyes and imagined that they were there; perhaps they were standing on the bridge, or maybe they were fish gliding through the calm waters, they might even be swans paddling through the lily pads. They imagined what they could see around them and tried to describe the picture in their minds by using their other senses. They looked carefully at Monet's painting again and counted how many colours they could see in the painting. They were surprised to learn that Monet only used five colours: cadmium yellow, vermillion (a red), cobalt blue, emerald green, rose madder deep (a pink), and silver-white. He didn't even use black for the darker areas because he thought black had a dulling effect so used colours like dark red and green instead. They looked at how Monet used the paint and thought about his use of brush strokes. They noticed that Monet used many layers in his work; the flowers are thick blobs of paint and the plants are different swirls and lines. Class 1 talked about the fact that even though Monet's flowers don't have the same shape as real flowers, they could still tell what they are because of the setting, the colours, and even the title of the painting. Class 1 described the water, its colours and brushstrokes and learned how Monet was able to show that it was moving by using choppy brushstrokes. The Class 1 children then created their own water lily pond image in the style of Monet, considering how to use their brushes effectively and taking time to mix an endless collection of blues and greens. They were careful to imitate the brush strokes that they had observed and use thick dollops of paint to create texture. When their work was completed Class 1 read the story 'The Magical Garden of Claude Monet' by Laurence Anholt. They had a super discussion about how the illustrations in the book are similar and different to 'The Water Lily Pond' and described what would be inside their own magical gardens.

Inspired by the children's fascination of Miss Harvey-Jones' Story Orchestra book 'Mozart's Magic Flute', during our Daily Dashboard sessions this week, Class 1 have been enjoying further books from this set. Consequently, the children have been learning about Tchaikovsky and thoroughly enjoyed listening to the story of Swan Lake. In light of this, Miss Harvey-Jones showed them some clips of cellists and violinists performing this piece in huge opera houses, as well as ballet dancers dancing to the music and played the score to the pupils as they painted. Some of the pupils then chose to add their own swans to their paintings.

Beyond our Art lessons though, Class 1 have found that the more they look, the more art really is everywhere. On 19th January they learnt about and celebrated the work of Paul Cezanne, born in 1839, whilst on 31st January it was *'Inspire Your Heart with Art Day'*, in light of which the children had the opportunity to pore over a selection of different works. They thought about which ones really spoke to them and made their hearts sing. Class 1 look forward to sharing more news of our art with you soon as we begin our own end of unit masterpieces.

The big event of the month for Class 2, was their trip to Tiverton Museum. They had a busy fun-packed day, full of artefacts, dressing up and learning about Tiverton in the Victorian times. A particular hit with all the children was the opportunity to ride a train called 'The Tivvy Bumper' and pull at the horn. In that room, there were clothes, suitcases and cameras, which led to conversations about holidays in the past and the huge changes in society that train travel started. Another memorable activity for the Class 2 children, was dressing up as Victorian schoolchildren and following the many rules they were given by the teacher. Mrs Marsh was very proud when the Victorian teacher commented on their beautiful cursive handwriting whilst writing on a slate. They learned fascinating facts about the man who built Heathcoat Factory and the type of factory owner he was. His factory made the lace that was used, not only in Queen Victoria's veil, but also in Princess Diana's.

The learning from the trip has fed into Class 2's English diary writing, which they will complete this week. They will be writing as Victorians who live in Tiverton – some in Knightshayes, some in Heathcoat Factory houses and some as poor children on the street. Next week, Class 2 will be moving into story writing, focusing on the middle and end of a story, using 'Fairs Fair' by Leon Garfield.

In Maths, all the Class 2 children have finished developing and honing their measuring skills, including measuring the perimeter and sometimes the area of rectangles. Year 6 also learnt to work out the area of parallelograms and triangles. This was useful when calculating how much outdoor space we have and thinking about our land use in Geography. This week Year 3 and Year 5 have been developing and extending their multiplication and division skills in maths. They are moving beyond the 'multiplication tables' to use their knowledge to calculate with 2-digit, 3-digit and even 4-digit numbers. Year 6 are working on fractions at the moment, thinking about how to simplify them and recognising equivalent fractions. Luckily Year 6 have a good working knowledge of their multiplication facts, as they need to be able to convert between mixed numbers and improper fractions, as well as change the denominator so they can compare and calculate. Help to keep skills sharp with regular visits to Times Table Rockstars at home. Is your child a Rock Legend or Rock Hero yet? The more they play the more chance they have to improve.

Class 2 have also been looking at materials, their properties and their purposes in Design and Technology and Science, they have also learnt about separating mixtures and solutions. Thank you to those that have shared further learning at home. They have found out that the more salt they used, the bigger the crystal would be, and that only 2 teaspoons will create an adequate crystal. The same experiment with sugar instead of salt didn't work (or hasn't yet). Mrs Marsh wonders if anyone has tried making crystals with sugar at home?

All the children had lots of fun at Forest School this month, where the focus was on birds. As well as their usual well-loved habits of fire-building, hot chocolate and roasted marshmallows, the children built on their previous knowledge of local British birds. They created dens to use as bird hides, then sat quietly and spotted birds. They made fat balls to take home for their garden birds and experimented with building nests out of different materials. Since that afternoon, the Class 2 children have worked on their shading skills while sketching birds and shared on 'Daily Dashboard' the birds that visit their garden. The final date for the 'Big Garden Birdwatch' is 20^{th} February, so the children can go online and record what they have seen – even if it is nothing!
